

Making Small Acreage Profitable – Workshop 1

Relevance. Small Acreage Landowners are a growing number of Agriculture producers in many counties across Texas. According to the 2002 Census of Agriculture, in Texas, 33% of all farms and ranches are 50 acres or less. This 33%, accounts for over 111,685 farms with over 38,210 of these farms owned and operated by women. Making small acreage profitable takes planning, goals and strategies, and implementation of your plan. Workshop one was coordinated to educate small acreage landowners on how to develop the Business Plan.

Response. The Making Small Acreage Profitable in East Texas Workshop One was held Thursday, September 6, 2007 at Thompson's Grill in Lufkin, Texas. This program was the first meeting in a series of six workshops to help small acreage landowners that are starting a new or existing Agriculture business on their small farm or ranch. Dr. Greg Clary, Extension Economist from the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Overton, was our speaker for the evening. Dr. Clary gave on overview of developing a business plan.

Results. A post only evaluation was given to determine satisfaction and program improvements of participants attending the Making Small Acreage Profitable in Nacogdoches County.

- **30 of 35 (85.71%)** respondents stated they were satisfied or very satisfied with the overall program.
- 33 of 34 (97.06%) respondents stated the information presented will help them make more informed decisions.
